BRAVE youngsters took to the stage to see who would represent the borough in a capital-wide public speaking competition.

School, was placed third.

All three won iPods for their efforts, with Hannah Warsame securing a place in the grand final with her talk entitled Don't Judge Me. She could win £2,000 for herself and £3,000 for her school at the Mermaid Theatre in central London in July.

The trophies were handed out by Ealing mayor Barbara Yeroleμου, who said: "Every single participant deserves a huge medal for taking part, putting their head above the parapet, facing their peers and giving a speech. I know how difficult that is."
